## Joe Skiffer | CAMP DIRECTOR AND HEAD COACH

Joe joined Urban School in 2010 as coach of the championship varsity boys basketball team and Assistant Director of Athletics, prior to being named Director in 2014. He is a native San Franciscan with a very successful high school career at St. Ignatius College Prep. Joe accepted a Division 1 scholarship to Boise State University where he was a three-year captain and starter. Joe went on to play semi-pro basketball before he started his career in education and coaching. Prior to joining Urban, Joe served as Assistant Coach at City College of San Francisco and St. Joseph's Notre Dame in Alameda, where he worked with numerous players who went on to play Division 1 basketball at elite programs throughout the United States.
